
- 18 recipient partners received 11,444 lbs. of food.



RECIPIENT PARTNERS SERVED

Bennett House: Bennett House is a residence in Fairfax for low-income seniors and is part of Mercy Housing, a national, non-profit affordable-housing organization. Mercy Housing believes that affordable housing and supportive programs help to transform neighborhoods and improve peoples' lives.

Homestead Terrace Community Center: Homestead Terrace, owned by Marin Housing Authority and located in Mill Valley, is a residential facility for very low and extremely low income Marin County residents. It consists of 28 studio units, for income eligible elderly or disabled people, capable of independent living.

Homeward Bound of Marin-Oma Village: Oma Village is an environmentally friendly, employment-focused housing development, designed particularly for families with children. It is located on a piece of land on Nave Drive in Novato, an infill location close to jobs, transit and other services — and away from environmentally sensitive areas.

Lifehouse: Lifehouse provides high-quality, personalized residential and direct support services to over 200 individuals with developmental disabilities in Marin and Sonoma county. Lifehouse's clients live in their own apartment or home, with support services ranging from two hours per week to 24-hour care.

Marin Services for Men: Marin Services for Men seeks to improve the quality of the lives of adult men and their families who are adversely affected by dependence on alcohol and/or drugs, by providing services and housing in a clean, safe, and supportive environment.

Mill Street Center: A Homeward Bound of Marin facility, Mill Street Center provides a critically important service to homeless men and women as the only night-to-night emergency shelter in Marin county.

New Beginnings Center: Part of the Homeward Bound of Marin family, NBC is an 80-bed shelter for single homeless adults - the largest homeless shelter in the county. It includes the Fresh Starts Culinary Academy, which welcomes residents and students from the community into a job-training program in their state-of-the-art kitchen. Students intern at the Jackson Cafe in downtown San Rafael, a partnership with Whistlestop, as well as at FSCA's chef events and in other venues.

North Bay Children's Center: North Bay Children's Center provides comprehensive high-quality child care and early education programs fueled by a vision of excellence and a spirit of innovation. Our mission is to assure optimal development for every child we serve. Our Garden of Eatin' program weaves a culture of health and wellness throughout the organization and serves as a model for other communities to emulate.

North Marin Community Services: NMCS provides educational, enrichment and support services at two facilities in Novato. Families can utilize childcare; after-school educational and enrichment programs; and family counseling services. Low-income adults, parents, immigrants and seniors can access emergency food pantry, temporary rental assistance program; job-seeking, financial planning and immigration services.

Parnow Friendship House: Parnow Friendship House, a 72 unit non-profit apartment community, provides housing for low-income seniors 62 years or older, or those under 62 who qualify for the need of an adapted apartment designed for mobility impairments.

People's Inter-Cities Fellowship: People's Inter-Cities Fellowship is a non-denominational, interracial, Bible-Centered Christian Fellowship. Church volunteers regularly distribute food to families in need within the Marin City community.

Ritter Center: Ritter Center offers critically-needed services to the homeless and very low-income residents of our county: food and clothing, health care, psychotherapy and substance abuse counseling, showers, laundry, restroom facilities, and more—all provided free of charge.

San Rafael Rotary Manor: A Beacon Communities and American Baptist Homes of the West (ABHOW) property, this 99-unit apartment building offers low-cost and safe housing for seniors. In addition to providing seniors with comfortable apartments, San Rafael Rotary Manor provides easy access to community services and myriad of activities.

Schurig Center for Brain Injury Recovery: To improve the quality of life for survivors of acquired brain injury and their families and to raise community awareness about the causes and effects of these disabilities.

St. Andrew Presbyterian Church: A Marin City-based multicultural congregation, St. Andrew models unity in diversity. They serve their diverse community in many ways, including a weekly food pantry for those in need.

St. Vincent de Paul Society of Marin: St. Vincent de Paul Society of Marin's Free Dining Room, which was created in 1981 as a free kitchen to serve Marin County's hungry citizens, is open every day, and has served more than two million meals to date.

Voyaer Carmel Center: Voyager Carmel Center became part of the Homeward Bound program in 1987. They provide short-term (1 to 4 months) and long-term housing for adults with mental illness. The center includes a 24-hour staff, a communal kitchen, and a program that focuses on crisis prevention, job readiness, and basic living skills improvement. They also share food with Homeward Bound's Fourth Street Center.

West Marin Community Services: The purpose of West Marin Community Services is to support programs and services that ensure the well-being of individuals and families in West Marin. Self-sufficiency, human dignity and social justice are the focus of their efforts.

Whistlestop: Whistlestop has been helping older adults age with dignity, grace, and independence since 1954. They provide delicious meals, classes, social programs, transportation, referral services, and more.
